 Seanich in the Province of British Columbia and subject
 to taxes which, with interest, amount to approximately
 \$24.85.
- 2. I enlisted in His Majesty's Military Forces on the 4th day of December 1915 and was engaged on active service in England and abroad in connection with the war since that date, and have not been discharged from His Majesty's Forces.
- 3. Owing to circumstances attributable to the said war including sickness caused by military service, my earnings have been considerably reduced, and my property has depreciated in value causing me financial loss, and owing to my being away from my business on active service, and since my return, I have not been able to adjust my affairs so as to enable me to raise enough money to pay the above mentioned taxes, and the said lands are about to be sold for taxes and such sale would result in undue hardship to me.

4. My co-owners have not paid the taxes on this land and I have aforetime paid the full amount of taxes in respect of the property, and I am desirous of obtaining relief in order that I may be enabled to pay the full amount of the taxes if possible at some future period, in order that I shall not lose all the moneys expended by me in respect of the property.

CLOSING OF SALOONS AT 9.PM.

Sir:-

I have the honour, by direction of the General Officer Commanding, Military District 11. to state that as you are no doubt aware all Saldons, Bars, Bottle Stores and places where intexicating liquor is supplied have for arlong time past been placed "Out of Bounds" for all troops in this District between the hours of 9.PM. and

- 2. It has been pointed out that the result is some-what aggravating to the soldier, especially to men recently joined, because of the law allowing their friends in civil life to be served up till 10.PM.
- 3. On donning His Majesty's uniform a man gives up much of his civil liberty in order to comply with the necessary rules of military discipline. It is considered undesirable that men volunteering to serve their country in this time of emergency should be made to feel that they are called on unnecessarily to come under any restriction which does not apply to civilians.
- 4. A soldier happening to be in a Bar at 9.PM. sees civilians being served while he is refused, and it is hard to convince him that this is not a grievance and an unnecessary punishment on him for enlisting.
- 5. It is therefore being submitted to all the City & Municipal Licensing Boards and to the Provincial Authorities that it is considered desirable to make the closing hour 9.PM. instead of 10.PM., and it is respectfully requested that you bring the matter before your Licensing Board and will kindly advise me as early as possible what action if any is intended to be taken.

CITY GARDEN COMPETITIONS.

- 1. Associations desiring to organize these competitions must notify the Provincial Horticulturist, Department of Agriculture, Victoria, on or before May 10th., using the form enclosed (Form No.1).
 - There shall not be less than 7 entries in each competition.
- 3. Gardons may be of any size, but not less than 1000 sq. ft.- (that is, 20' x 50', 30' x 33b' or 40' x 25').
- 4. The Department of Agriculture will furnish circulars of instruction in gardening to Associations for distribution, and direct to individuals, on request.
- 5. On request the Department will, if possible, supply the services of Assistant Horticulturists in the organizing of competitions, and for lectures on 'Gardening' at meetings to be called for the purpose.
- Judges will visit the gardens 3 times during the season. Department will supply one judge, and others, if required, are to be provided by the Association.
- 7. There shall be at least \$45. offered in cash prizes as follows. First, \$20; Second, \$15; Third, \$10; of this amount, the Association ecnducting the competition will be entitled to a grant of \$35., which grant will be paid to the Association by the Department of Agriculture.
- 8. An entry fee of not less than 50 cents and not more than (1., the exact amount to be at the discretion of the Association, shall be paid by each competitor into the funds of the Association, which money shall be applied to the amount to be contributed by the Association to the prize money. All of the gardens entered for competition must be within the area defined by the Association holding the competition.
- 9. All individual entries for each competition must be forward-e4 by the Secretary of the Association to the Provincial Horticulturist,
 Victoria, B.C., not later than June 1st. Use the form enclosed"Individual Entry Form Crop Competitions" (Form No.2.)
- Score card to be used in judging :- 20 Quantity & Value of Crop 20 10. kind 20
- The scores of any competitor not using any skilled help will 17. be increased 10%.

The score of gardens in the first year of cultivation, from old sod or newly cleared, will be increased 10%.

12. Competitors can get information on Gardening at any time from the Department of Agriculture, the Assistant Herticulturist of the

District, or the Judges.
